DIRECTIONS:

From the North

Take I-91 South to exit 13B, to Rte. 5 South, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E (Eastern States Exposition) grounds *Gate 2* (about 1.6 miles on the left).

From the South

Take I-91 North to Mass. Exit 3, to Rte. 5 North, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E (Eastern States Exposition) grounds *Gate 2* (about 1.6 miles on the left).

Enter through Gate 2 and continue straight on the Avenue of States (with parking on both sides). Storrowton Tavern will soon be seen on the left. Walk through the wooden arch with Storrowton Tavern sign above. The red double doors on the right provide easier access for those using a wheelchair or walker, others follow brick path around the side of the building to the main entrance.



WELL-READ DRAGONS



"A Writer's House in Wales" by Jan Morris

A few weeks ago while perusing the local library I came across a lovely little book, "A Writer's House in Wales" by Jan Morris. I knew Jan Morris, known mostly as a world travel writer, but I was intrigued none-the-less.

This is the story of her home, Trefan Morys, on the banks of the river Dwyfor, not far from the village of Llanystrumdwy. The history of a dwelling on this spot can be traced back to the 1100's with the first historical records referring to Trefan dating

from 1352. In the late 1700's it was acquired by one Zaccheus Hughes, an Anglican vicar, who grandified, modernized and enlarged the estate, including building a fine stable which served as Jan and Elizabeth Morris' home and is the subject of the book. The manor house on the estate, Plas Trefan, where Jan and Elizabeth raised their family, is now inhabited by their son, Twm and his wife and family.

Throughout the book, the reader is invited into the history, legends, landscapes, and peace of Jan's life at Trefan Morys. For me, reading this sweet little book was an armchair journey to a place I too am deeply rooted in: Wales. It was an invitation to come in for a cup of tea, or glass of wine, while Ms. Morris shares the stories that make life in Wales so interesting and special. At only 143 pages, give yourself a treat and take the journey.



Omission from the last newsletter: The meaning of TALIESIN (Frank Lloyd Wright's house name): Means "shining brow", derived from Welsh tal "brow" and iesin "shining". It was also the name of a 6th-century Welsh poet and bard.

Our days included a range of seminars and Welsh films – including topics like the history of the Welsh church, Wales in the Olympics, a lecture on Paul Robeson's relationship with Welsh miners, the excavation of the lost bones of one of the first Welsh immigrants to Patagonia, and the introduction to the "People's Collection", a free, massive two-way archive of Welsh stories, photos and historical documents. Our evenings were full of raucous and rowdy Welsh fun. On Friday evening, we went to a festive, celebratory dinner before moving into the lobby bar for impromptu and informal singing. On
