
BRUNCH IN NEW YORK CITY, WELSH CHURCH SERVICE, TE BACH and NOSON LAWEN: Sunday, September 10

## **WELL-READ DRAGONS**

**Wales** figured twice, or rather it *should* have been twice, in the Hartford Courant's Travel section on Sunday, May 14, 2017. Wales was listed under WEB DEALS as follows:

As a tie-in to the new movie "King Arthur: Legend of the Sword", the Wales tourism folks have put together information about Arthur sites in their country. <a href="http://tinyurl.com/jw5v4em">http://tinyurl.com/jw5v4em</a>. Might be worth checking it out!

Wales did <u>not</u> get a mention in another headline: WISCONSIN ADVENTURE "On the Wright Trail". Writing about Frank Lloyd Wright, it focuses on Wright's architectural bold designs that are embodied in **TALIESIN**, his home, studio and school. Frank Lloyd Wright, was born in 1867, 150 years ago on June 8, 2017.

#### WalesOnline tells us:

His mother, a Welsh speaker, emigrated from south Cardiganshire as a young girl with her parents and Frank Lloyd Wright was eventually brought up in a part of Wisconsin nicknamed, "God Almighty Lloyd Joneses Valley".

#### www.<u>TaliesinPreservation.org</u> says:

The large Welsh family of farmers, teachers and ministers that settled part of the Wisconsin River valley near Spring Green in the middle of the nineteenth century included a young woman named Anna Lloyd Jones. This teacher, headstrong with beautiful, dark, curly hair, caught the eye of William Carey Wright, a preacher and musician. William soon



won her affections and they married. On June 8, 1867 in Richland Center, a small town 20 miles west of Spring Green, Anna gave birth to a son. They named him Frank.

Young Frank Lloyd Wright spent many summers in his teen years on the farm his uncle James worked in the valley. In fact, Wright considered the valley to be his home ... much more so



than the house in Madison, Wisconsin, where he spent the rest of the year. During his summers in the valley, lessons he gleaned from nature would find their way into his later work again and again.

WalesOnline continues: He went on to revert to his mother's family name, from Frank Lincoln Wright, as a 14-year-old when his father walked out on the family.

It was his mother's influence that also ensured some of his buildings had Welsh names, including his two "Taliesin" houses, while others were adorned with the Welsh motto "Y gwir yn erbyn y byd" ("The truth against the world").

So why Taliesin? It is reported that his mother loved Welsh poetry, especially the Book of Taliesin, a famous Middle Welsh document dating from the early 14th century, though some poems are thought to date from as early as the 10th century. There was also a Brythonic poet named Taliesin living as early as the sixth century. Some of his poems praise the Kings of the time and he may have been the court's bard. It's a shame that the Hartford Courant missed the explanation of the name Taliesin; it would have been interesting to many people I'm sure who don't know the meaning of Taliesin.

From <a href="https://www.TaliesinPreservation.org">www.TaliesinPreservation.org</a> again: In 1976, Taliesin was declared a National Historic Landmark by The National Park Service. Since then, Taliesin joined the ranks of "Priority 1" threatened landmarks — a status shared by only 5% of the nation's other 2,500 National Historic Landmarks. In 1994, Taliesin was put on the list of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.


### A WELSH CHILDHOOD by Alice Thomas-Ellis - A review

A lifelong yearning for what is gone or out of reach. Childhood memories. Sand in your sandwiches at the beach. Slugs in the outhouse. Old customs. History. Folk tales. Passage of time. Loss. Fleeting beauty. The comfort of a place that seems timeless.

Hiraeth.

These are the elements of "A Welsh Childhood" by Alice Thomas Ellis that resonated with me.

A bittersweet memoir about growing up in and around the small village of Penmaenmawr in North Wales in the 1930s and beyond. There are challenging times, as the author establishes her own family and lives with small children in what today would be considered primitive



conditions, far from others in the stark mountains. But she looks back at those days as the happiest of her life. Throughout her joys and struggles, the fierce love of place is captured, both the rugged and the delicate elements.


This book, originally published in 1990 and reproduced in 1997, this time with atmospheric black and white photographic illustrations by Patrick Sutherland, evokes the evanescent mental state the Welsh call Hiraeth.

## TRAVELS IN AN OLD TONGUE by Pam Petro - A review

I've just finished a great little book entitled "Travels in an Old

Tongue" by Pam Petro. (You may remember Pam, as she spoke to the Welsh Society on "Hiraeth" a couple of years ago.) Well, this book, published in 1997 by Harper Collins, tells the tale of her worldwide travels to find a place where she can be forced to speak Welsh and become comfortable with the language. She visits natives of Wales and Welsh speakers in such far-flung places as Norway, Japan, Greece, and France, but alas they all slip into the English language eventually and she is no further ahead in her



quest for comfort with Welsh. It isn't until she lands in Patagonia among the descendants of the Welsh settlers where Spanish, which she doesn't speak, is the alternative language so she becomes comfortable with the Welsh tongue. It is a long journey, covering months and miles, but it's an interesting tale of travels written in a light-hearted manner. I recommend it to anyone who is interested in the "ancient Welsh tongue" or just wants to spend time armchair travelling.

#### CHURCHILL HID BRITISH ART IN WELSH CAVES

The incredible story of how Sir Winston Churchill ordered Britain's art treasures to be hidden away inside Welsh caves amid fears of a German invasion has resurfaced.

Masterpieces by Rembrandt and Van Gogh were among those concealed inside a disused slate mine at Manod Mawr, in Merionethshire, Wales amid fears they could be destroyed by an invading Nazi army or from a bombing campaign.

Churchill was said to be so concerned with the potential damage to morale that losing the treasures could have, that he had a team of experts move the precious collection away from the National Gallery in London. Tensions within Britain were running high in the summer of 1940, after the British and French armies were forced to flee mainland Europe and the advanced Germans by evacuating from Dunkirk beach.

The photo shows experts transporting some of the art treasures on re-purposed rails originally installed deep inside the cavern during its use as a slate mine.

Susan Davies Sit's grandfather, John Chaplin an Electrical Engineer, worked on the electricity for the caves. He couldn't tell his family until after the war had ended.

There could have been a 'New Wales' on the east coast of North America... There's a New England in the USA and a Nova Scotia in Canada. There might also have been a "New Wales". Between 1616 and 1632, William Vaughan of Llangyndeyrn, Carmarthenshire, sought to establish a Welsh colony in Newfoundland. His efforts were in vain.

## WELSH NATIONAL DRESS AT OUR ST DAVID'S DAY EVENTS

We are extremely lucky to have two of our Board members who wear Welsh National Dress at our St. David's Day Luncheons, they are Edward Brown and Beth Roberts Brown.



Beth wears the National Costume of Wales for women which dates back to the 18th century, based on earlier rural outfits. Ed has pulled together his own outfit worn by slate quarrymen from North Wales, in a nod to Beth's quarrymen roots from Snowdonia and from Granville, NY.

This is how Ed described the

outfit: My costume is loosely based on clothing worn by mannequins dressed as quarrymen in a 2003 display at the Llechwedd slate caverns in Blaenau Ffestiniog, north Wales. This unusual underground quarry operation began in 1848. Though in no way a uniform, the cap, vest, and bandana were probably common in both the 19th and early 20th centuries. They reflect what a docent there told us, that the men did not wear what we today would think of as typical laborer work clothes; rather they proudly wore the same kind of attire they would to any other activity in the community. Beth recalls her Taid coming home from a Granville, NY quarry looking quite well dressed, though covered in a layer of gray quarry dust.

## **WELSH FUN FACTS**

There were still places in Wales where no one could speak English in the 20th century....

As late as 1921, 56% of the population of the parish of Llanddeiniolen, near Caernarfon, had no knowledge of English and there was one parish on the Llyn peninsula, Bodferin, where everyone was monoglot Welsh. In the 1930s there were nearly 100,000 people in Wales who could speak only Welsh.
