

# Margaret Lloyd, Welsh Poet

Margaret Lloyd was born in Liverpool, England, of Welsh parents and grew up in a Welsh community in Utica, New York. She received a PhD from the University of Leeds, England, and has published a book on William Carlos Williams' poem Paterson. Travelling on My Own Errands: Voices of Women from The Mabinogi is her fourth collection of original poetry. Her poetry honors include a grant from the



National Endowment for the Humanities, several Pushcart nominations, a fellowship to the Bread Loaf Writers Conference, and residencies at Yaddo and Hawthornden Castle in Scotland where she finished *Travelling on My Own Errands*. Lloyd is Professor Emeritus at Springfield College, Massachusetts.

My mum Eileen and grandmother Irene were kneading dough for bread and warming the griddle for our morning Welsh Cakes. I loved to help them cut the circles of dough. Even today, the smell of allspice and cinnamon takes me back to the warmth of that kitchen filled with love.

My mother used to take me to a café in our village that served tea, Welsh Cakes. They filled every teapot with boiling

water straight out of their giant kettle. I told my mum as a child: "One day, I am going to open a bakery and call it the Copper Kettle." We dreamed we would do it together. Living 3,000 miles away from each other made it impossible.

My mum passed away in June 2013. I found myself craving the taste of Welsh Cakes. I began griddling them every morning for my sons and then neighbors and friends. I realized I had found my calling and launched Copper Kettle Bakery. I cannot wait to tell you the rest of the story."

# From the Central New Brunswick Welsh Society THE MOTIVATION TO LEAVE

The migration of families from southwest Wales is somewhat unlikely, given the very nature of this area. This was the very heart of Welsh life and culture, a decidedly rural area characterized by small free-holdings, hamlets and villages whose people were stubbornly Welsh and almost all unilingual Welsh speakers. What would drive these families to the uncertainties of crossing the Atlantic to settle in the wilds of British North America?

The answer lies in the economic and social conditions of Wales following the Napoleonic Wars. A recession in the early 19th century resulted in great poverty and unemployment in Wales. Wages fell because there were more workers than jobs, exacerbated by the replacement of people by new machinery and an increasing population. The protectionist Corn Law imposed high tariffs on imported grain which kept prices high. In addition, there had been a serious crop failure the summer of 1816 which was known as 'the year without a summer'. Heavy rains and cool temperatures led to crop failures and widespread famine with the price of food skyrocketing. Villages and towns could not support the vast number of poor families. People were dying of hunger and sickness. Cardiganshire and Carmarthenshire were the hardest hit counties of Wales.

By the early 1800's, arable land in Wales had become depleted due to the continuous planting of grains during the Napoleonic Wars, with many farms no longer able to sustain families. Many families had already been forced off their farms by the Enclosure Acts which enforced the enclosure of common land and larger farm properties. These common lands had traditionally been available to small freeholders for grazing their stock and many were unable to pay the fees now charged for the use of this land. Others were unable to cover the cost of fencing their freeholds as required by the new laws.

The loss of their lands had a profound effect on Welsh freeholders who had a deep attachment to their land and an intense pride in their lineage. Land ownership gave them standing in their communities no matter how small the free-holding. Their pride in continued and unbroken hereditary property meant that the custom of *cyfran*, dividing the land amongst all sons on the death of the landowner, survived until the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. While this reflected the deep-rooted Welsh belief in land ownership at all costs, it unfortunately also resulted in increasingly smaller free-holdings, with most farms being smaller than 100 acres. By the early 1800's there

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was no longer an ability to divide the lands, thus depriving the sons of freeholders of the means to acquire land.

Add the difficulties faced by the Dissenting churches, and small wonder that the *Albion* sailed with a full load of passengers. In North America, the Welsh emigrants could settle on their own land, worship in their own way and hopefully, provide a better future for their families.



# Gwydir Castle's 1624 Marriage Chest

An ancient Welsh marriage chest made for Gwydir castle has finally been returned after a 96 year absence. Carved with the Wynn family arms, it was lost in 1921 when the castle - and its historic contents - were put up for sale.

Present owners Peter Welford and Judy Corbett have spent years researching and locating items sold in the controversial sale, including the Grade -1 listed castle's 1640's paneled dining room, discovered in a warehouse in Brooklyn, New York.





It had been bought in the sale by American newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst, who planned to install it at San Simeon, his mock castle in California.

The wedding chest was made in 1624 to commemorate the marriage of the alchemist Sir Owen Wynn (3rd Baronet) to Grace Williams, the niece of Archbishop John Williams.

It has been bought from a private owner in the Wirral and the purchase has been made possible by a donation by American benefactors John and Maureen Winn, who are passionate about Welsh history and culture and felt the chest should be returned to the home of their Wynn ancestors.

Ms Corbett said: We thank them from the bottom of our hearts.

"The chest is an important piece of early Welsh heraldic furniture and a Welsh relic of huge significance, and it is moving to think that it would have been at Gwydir when the house was sacked in two occasions during the Civil War. We are so happy to welcome it home."

The owners are still on the hunt for the panelled room which was also bought by Hearst.

"We are in touch with the Hearst Trustees and they are looking in their warehouse and going through their records," said Ms Corbett, who is a writer. "We are keeping our fingers crossed."

Gwydir Castle, near Llanwrst, and its 10-acre garden, which is also Grade-1 listed, were established by the Wynn family about 1500.

In the 1570's, Gwydir was home to Katherine of Berain, cousin to Elizabeth 1, and the castle has associations with the Babington Plot of 1586 and the Gunpowder Plot of 1605.

# WELSH BEERS COME TO THE U.S.A.

Llandudno's Wild Horse Brewing Company in North
Wales are embarking on a Trans-Atlantic collaboration with

a top American craft brewery and are swapping recipes with lechyd Da Brewing Company from Elkhart, Indiana after striking up an intercontinental friendship online.

While lechyd Da's beer – a sweet stout brewed with vanilla pods and cocoa nibs - is available here in North Wales, a Wild Horse beer will also be brewed over in the USA. Conwy-based artisan chocolatier Baravelli's will provide the cocoa nibs and vanilla pods for the brew.



The two breweries struck up a relationship after Dave from Wild Horse spotted a story about lechyd Da – a name that links back to Chip's Welsh heritage - in an American brewing magazine. Their eye-catching name, a phrase which also appears in Wild Horse's branding, grabbed Dave's attention and the breweries linked up on social media.

Summer Lewis said: "My husband's family came to America from Wales many generations ago, so the ties aren't recent, but it's a fun and historical way to set us apart. I know our patrons will really get a kick out of us collaborating with a Welsh brewery." Patrick Glover, North Wales

And on another Welsh beer venture with America, The Sunken Hundred (Cantre'r Gwaelod) in Brooklyn, NYC is now selling "Tiny Rebel". Illtyd Barrett, owner, says: The New Year's present we've been dreaming of! Tiny Rebel Beer from Newport, Wales, just arrived! We are so chuffed to have Cwtch Welsh Red Ale (voted Champion Beer of Britain 2015) and Clwb Tropicana on tap. Come and see why everyone is raving about this brilliant Welsh brewery. Only in Sunken Hundred. Iechyd da, bois!
