# Directions to Storrowton Tavern, West Springfield, MA.

Storrowton Tavern is on the Big E (Eastern States Exposition) grounds, near Gate 2.

To reach Gate 2 using GPS, enter 1535 Memorial Ave, West Springfield, MA or "Big E Gate 2" but NOT 1305 Memorial Ave (the business address on their website and Google search result).

#### From the North

Take I-91 South to exit 13B, to Rte. 5 South, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E grounds Gate 2 (about 1.6 miles on the left).

#### From the South

Take I-91 North to Mass. Exit 3, to Rte. 5 North, to Rte. 147 West (Memorial Avenue) to Big E grounds Gate 2 (about 1.6 miles on the left).

Enter through Gate 2 and continue straight on the Avenue of States (with parking on both sides). Storrowton Tavern will soon be seen on the left. Walk through the wooden arch with Storrowton Tavern sign above; follow the brick path around the side of the building to the main entrance.

## NORTH AMERICAN FESTIVAL OF WALES (NAFOW)



Once again, the North America Festival of Wales surpassed itself and was an amazing weekend full of Welsh singing, language, music, incredible seminars, friendly Welsh faces, tea and Welsh cakes, a London Welsh choir: Eschoir, Moch Pryderi, a Welsh folk group complete with a Welsh triple

harp, and so much more.

Five of us, plus a member's Welsh cousin from Anglesey, attended

this year. We flew down to DC, as the cost of renting a vehicle and driving down was the same. The hotel is where everything happens at NAFOW apart from the Grand Concert, which this year was a short school bus ride away. Welsh language was heard and spoken in the elevators, the restaurants, the coffee shop, and the seminars. One seminar of particular interest (with a full house the second time it was presented) was *The Supreme Court*

raved about *Driven By The Soul of Welsh Music* by Mal Pope, a BBC presenter, who's life has been driven by music and who has just taken up the position of Chair of the Swansea International Festival for 2019.

# AFFILIATED WELSH ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING AT NAFOW

Did you know that we are part of a global group of over 120 Welsh organizations? The umbrella organization is the Welsh North America Association (WNAA). Their web site is TheWNAA.org. Once a year, representatives from across the world meet at NAFOW to discuss the health and vitality of their Welsh organizations. Listed on the WNAA website are Societies from Canada, the USA, Wales, New Zealand, and Australia. We know there are Organizations in Japan, France and elsewhere but they are not yet affiliated with WNAA. This year, there were about 13 organizations represented: Wisconsin, Ohio, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Massachusetts, Missouri, Calgary and Vancouver in Canada, New York, South Carolina, Florida and Wales.

We are as different as we are far apart in miles. Some Societies have regular Gymanfa Ganu, some none at all. Some societies have active Welsh choirs, and some do not. Philadelphia has the oldest ethnic society in the USA with 300 members. South Carolina has an annual Oyster Roast; Pittsburg a Daffodil Luncheon; Iowa has a challenge to get members to travel because they cover several hundreds of miles of state roads; Vancouver has their own hall, a burden to maintain but a treasure to have; Vancouver and our own WSWNE hold regular Genealogy Workshops, a huge draw for increasing memberships; Philadelphia has 300 members, St. Louis and WSWNE have 50, and Western NY is a fledgling Society just starting up.

For all our differences we are so very similar. We work hard to gain new members, especially attracting younger ones. We put on events that we hope our members will enjoy. We get together to enjoy being with people with Welsh roots. This priceless meeting at NAFOW helps us get ideas: for new events, how to attract presenters, where to hold our events, and so much more. Being a part of this global network enriches our Society and gives us access to a wealth of ideas and a bucket full of friends across the world.

#### THE FIRST MAP OF WALES

An exhibition is being held for the man who produced the first map of Wales in 1568. Humphrey Llwyd will be celebrated at the **National Library of Wales in Aberystwyth, Ceredigion.** 

The library's map curator, Huw Thomas, said: "It's the birth - in a way - of the Welsh nation." Llwyd, from Denbigh, Denbighshire, who died in 1568, will be recognised in the exhibition to mark the 450th anniversary of his death.

He produced the first published map of Wales - previously it had been featured on maps of England and Wales or Britain, but never in its own right.

Llwyd sent a manuscript of the map to the Netherlands so fellow

Llwyd sent a manuscript of the map to the Netherlands so fellow cartographer Abraham Ortelius could include it in his first modern atlas, published in 1573.

Mr Thomas said despite its "obvious deficiencies in geography" it went on to be the view of Wales throughout Europe for the next 140 years. He added: "He was one of the great figures of the Welsh Renaissance." The exhibit opened in August, 2018. (BBCWales.com)

# Member Martha Davies (1941-2018)

Martha Ann Davies of Lincoln, Nebraska, beloved wife, mother, grandmother, sister, and aunt, died Thursday, August 23, 2018 at The Monarch Hospice House in Lincoln of a glioblastoma brain tumor. Martha was born June 27th, 1941 in Santa Monica, California to Lucius and Josephine (Williams) Mull. She is survived by her loving husband Berwyn Emrys Jones of Lincoln, Nebraska. She is survived also by her children Elinor (Dickey) Kelliher of Ludlow, Massachusetts and Albert Dickey of Austin, Texas; two grandsons, Patrick and Owen Kelliher of Ludlow, Massachusetts and a sister Catherine Smythe of Laguna Beach, California.



Most recently, Martha was a well known Welsh-English translator, historian and genealogist. She had learned the Welsh language while living in Aberystwyth with her late husband, James Dickey. In recent years she was the Archivist at the Archive for Welsh America at the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre in Wymore, Nebraska. In addition, she served tirelessly on the Board of Directors for the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project. One of her chief passions was translating the stories of the Welsh-American settlers and sharing these stories with others. These stories were brought to life in historical reenactments. Martha interpreted the story of Ellinor Francis, an American pioneer who had come from Wales in 1852.

In 2016, she was honoured by the Gorsedd of the Bards of the Isle of Britain at the National Eisteddfod in recognition of her translation of countless newspaper articles, histories of Welsh-American communities, and hundreds of obituaries of Welsh-American ancestors, as well as her translation and publication of four books of Welsh-American history, one with her late husband Phillips G. Davies of Ames, Iowa. This honour is rarely bestowed on an American.

Her final major project was the production of a short film about Welsh settlers in Nebraska in the 1800's for the Nebraska Sesquicentennial. It is available on the website www.welshheritageproject.org and has been shown on several public television stations.



Her genealogical research led her to the discovery that she was the ninth great grand daughter of Myles Standish, the Captain of the Mayflower. She was enormously proud of her membership in the Nebraska Mayflower Society. She was also recently inducted into P.E.O., a philanthropic organization supporting the advancement of women.

Martha has touched countless others with her kindness, generosity, enthusiasm and joy. The remarkable serenity and peace with which she faced her transition to everlasting life will continue to serve as an example to all who spent time with her in her last days. She will be greatly missed.

Memorials may be made to the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project Endowment, the Monarch Hospice House, or St Mark's on the Campus.

Note: Martha and husband Berwyn were long-time and founding members of WSWNE. Martha was the Welsh Language group leader, the Newsletter Editor for many years, and the first Secretary of WSWNE. Martha was a volunteer columnist for Welsh American Genealogy Society (WAGS) and had worked tirelessly with the WAGS home office in transitioning some of their collection into the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project. WSWNE has sent our old newsletters and Meeting records to GPWHP for archiving. Martha and Berwyn continued their support of WSWNE while living and working in Nebraska, and the WSWNE continues to support their Welsh Heritage Project. We will all miss Martha tremendously.

because it gave life to my images of my Welsh family. I think it's possible that

some of this music was known or played in 1800's Wales or by my Welsh Americans in Ohio. The music speaks to the nature of the people and how well they express it.

The four wines, from a wine shop in Glastonbury, CT, were of differing varieties, none Welsh, but all well chosen to compliment the cheese.


# WHALING MUSEUM, NEW BEDFORD, MA



Seen at the Whaling Museum in New Bedford, Massachusetts were these Panbone panels by Welshman William Lewis Roderick, made about 1847-1856. William Lewis Roderick was a surgeon on board the whaling ship *Adventure* out of London on three South Sea voyages. (British regulations required surgeons to be on board each whaling ship.) He was also an artist, and his scrimshaw work of carving on whalebones was considered to be "among the best pictorial scrimshaw".

## WELL-READ DRAGONS

A new book of local history has been published. Crime, Courts and Community in Mid-Victorian Wales: Montgomeryshire, People and Places by Dr Rachael Jones is a detailed look at life during the 1870s as seen through a study of the criminal justice system. Fascinating details such as the chief constable's campaign against brothels in Newtown and a raid on the Waggon and Horses public house provide a vivid picture of life. There are particular focuses on women's experiences, social relations and how people used the law to stand up for themselves. The voices of individuals are read in extracts from their testimonies, and local



speech including thee and thou is heard. The book is available for purchase from the University of Wales Press or amazon.com.
